Dare to Do Right

"I dare you!" are words boys and girls often hear from friends who want you to prove to them that you are brave or strong or daring. They may ask you to do something that your parents or teachers have told you not to do—something that you know is wrong to do. I have learned that when we do something we know is wrong, we show weakness rather than strength. A person shows true bravery and strength only when he has the courage to do right.

"Once, when a young boy named Jack was about seven years old, he had a pal whom he liked very much. They often walked home from school together. ... They talked of being brave and of being able to do many things.

"Sometimes they would dare each other to jump across a ditch or to climb a tree just to prove that they were brave or that they could do things they had seen older boys and girls do.

"As they walked home one day they stood out by the road and talked about who was the fastest runner in the school. ... When Jack strongly insisted that he could run faster than his friend, he turned to Jack and said, 'If you're so fast, I dare you to run across the road before that car gets here!'

"Jack looked up the road and saw a car a short distance away. Without another word he dashed into the road to prove that he was fast and brave. A moment later the car's brakes squealed! Its bumper hit him, and Jack landed in an unconscious heap.

"When Jack opened his eyes, his aching body, a hurt pride, and his mother's anxious face made him realize that he had been neither fast nor brave. He had only been foolish. He had brought sadness to himself and to others. ...

"The lesson he learned ... has been valuable to him throughout his life. ***He learned that the only dare a person should ever accept is the DARE TO DO RIGHT.***

"If you accept a dare to do something that is not right, something that Heavenly Father or your parents would not want you to do, you will be left with a sad and disappointed feeling. When you dare to do right you will have a good feeling about yourself.

"May you always DARE TO DO RIGHT.

From the Pastor's Perspective

Tomorrow begins the sacred season of Lent. Below I have included Items of note that I've been asked to share or share again! I hope that you will take the time to prepare with your child for the Lenten Season and repeat some of the information about why the church observes such patterns during Lent. Here is some other news

Guidelines & Rule for Fasting & Abstinence During Lent

Lent is a time of baptismal renewal and preparation for the renewal of baptismal promises at Easter. Here are the following regulations Roman Catholics follow:

1. All Catholics 14 years and older are to abstain from all meat on Ash Wednesday, on all Fridays of Lent (unless a particular Friday is a solemnity, i.e. Saint Patrick's Day or Saint Joseph Day – March 19 or the Annunciation of the Lord – March 25) and Good Friday.
2. All Catholics who are between the ages of 18-59 are obliged to fast on Ash Wednesday and Good Friday. (Canon 1252)
3. Fasting permits one full meal and two lesser meals, which combined are not greater than the full meal. Eating between meals is not permitted.
4. A spirit of fasting is recommended during all of Lent in anticipation of the great feast of Easter. In this way, Christians express their hunger for God, their responsibility to the poor and their recognition of the Kingdom of God as the answer to all human hungers.
5. "Pastors and parents are to see to it that minors who are not bound by the law of fast and abstinence are educated in an authentic sense of penance (Canon 1252)."

Privileges – People on the Move: Airport workers, travelers and others while on board ships or airplanes are dispensed for the laws of fasting and abstinence for the duration of their journey (except Good Friday). However, it is desirable that those so dispensed should perform some pious work in compensation.

Easter Duty: Every Catholic is to receive Holy Communion at least once between the First Sunday of Lent (March 1, 2009) and Trinity Sunday (June 7, 2009) unless a just cause would warrant some other time of year (Canon 920).

Scholarships for Catholic School Students

The Catholic Foundation is pleased to remind you of the Philip J. Maloof Scholarship Fund, providing tuition assistance to Catholic Schools students in Bernalillo County. Scholarships are awarded based on financial need and academic achievement. Scholarship will be given in amounts of \$500, \$1,000 for the 2009-2010 school year.

- **75th ANNIVERSARY COMMITTEE MEETING:** Sunday, March 29, 1 p.m. in Mahady Meeting Room.
- **Sunday, June 7, 12 – 3 p.m.:** 75th anniversary Picnic and Raffle. We hope to be able to welcome our new pastor at this event. This will also be a special time to say farewell to the Blessed Sacrament Community that has served our parish for 43 years.
- **Saturday, June 13 – Evening Prayer Service and reception:** This is the actual day of the canonical erection of the parish.
- **Sunday, June 14** – Last weekend Masses with Fr. Lane, SSS – Welcome to the new pastor. This is also our annual weekend when we hear of our support to our twin SSS parish in India, that we have adopted for these many years (Fr. Lane moves on Wednesday, June 17 – the new pastor begins on Tuesday, June 16.)
- **Saturday, November 7, 5 p.m. Fiesta Mass with Archbishop Sheehan and Anniversary Banquet Dinner at Hotel Albuquerque.** During this celebration, former priests and religious will be attending, including this author. Tickets will be sold to support the meal.

Catechesis on the Mass – Issue #452: Why do we not take Holy Communion from the Tabernacle during Mass? Communion Ministers have received a special article about this and are asked to pick it up in the sacristy. We all participate in the sacrifice of the Mass and receive communion from this sacrifice. Hosts are reserved for those who are not able to attend the Eucharistic liturgy or for the sick and viaticum. If you would like a copy of this article, please see me or come to the sacristy for the copies.

Traveling Exhibit on Hiroshima: Different parishes in the archdiocese will be hosting a special exhibit with photographs of the bombing of 1945. We have agreed to host the exhibit for a week as part of the continued awareness of the effects of nuclear war. Enjoy the exhibit from February 26 – March 6 in the vestibule and Committee Room. Let us continue to pray and work for peace and nuclear disarmament, sharing our resources with the greater needs in the world. Come after school with your child to discuss our history.

Novena for Peace and Social Justice: Plans for the upcoming annual rosary novena this May 3 - May 13 at St. Charles is underway! If you'd like to join the planning committee, please call Fatima Portugal at 235-5773. (We will not join for the novena on Sunday, May 10 due to Mother's Day). The novena ends on the feast of Our Lady of the Blessed Sacrament and Fatima. To help us with our costs for the prayer booklet and novena, please consider sponsoring an ad for the prayer booklet.

RCIA: We have several adults and ten children who are becoming Catholic or completing their initiation. Pray for them, especially as they present themselves to the archbishop on March 1 at the Rite of Election and Call to Continuing Conversion. Those who are interested in becoming Catholic may now begin for next year – join us on Wednesday nights for sessions. Furthermore, during Lent, let us enjoy our participation in the special rites that our children and adults will have as they grow toward the Easter Vigil and their initiation. Readings will be from Cycle A for the Scrutinies on weeks three to five during Lent.

Parish Center & Library: Since the Blessed Sacrament Fathers and Brothers have “left the building” and we are in the process of transition,

with the archdiocese and parish assuming the management and bill paying, the parish is utilizing it well and enjoying the spaces. We have been able to add three new meeting spaces and offices for our Pastoral Staff and volunteers. Our new Mahady Meeting Room and Courtyard, with the kitchen so handy, has helped many of our regular meeting groups. Upstairs, the former music room is now the SSS Heritage Room, with special books, items and history of the Blessed Sacrament Community, as well as Eucharistic theology magazines and books. All the writings of Saint Peter Julian Eymard and *Emmanuel Magazine: The Magazine of Eucharistic Spirituality* are available for parishioners to enjoy and read. In our former SSS Library, we are grateful to Vicenta Mata and esteemed educator Evangeline Baca for organizing and updating the shelves. This is now a parish library to enjoy. The former upstairs TV Room is now the Eymard Meeting Room (due to the pictures of our beloved saint on the walls).

Preparing for Lent, Triduum & Eastertime

Lent begins this year on Ash Wednesday, February 25. The Triduum and Easter are set with the lunar calendar. Easter is always chosen to be on the Sunday after the first full moon after the first day of the vernal equinox (spring in our hemisphere.) Then we count backwards to select Ash Wednesday. The Triduum begins on Holy Thursday at 4 p.m. (This is also when Lent ends.) The Triduum is the holiest, and most important liturgical season of the year, three days long from Holy Thursday to Easter Sunday. The "40 Days of Lent" are counted from the First Sunday of Lent until Holy Thursday, inclusive. Sundays "count" in Lent – hence this is why they are called "First Sunday" of Lent, "Second Sunday," etc. The days after Ash Wednesday are called "the Thursday after Ash Wednesday," "the Friday after Ash Wednesday," etc. If you ever noticed the words to the song, "These Forty Days of Lent," the verses speak about the readings on the First Sunday of Lent.

The season first began as an intense period of preparation for those becoming Christian. Then, for the baptized, it became an annual retreat to renew one's baptismal covenant. Let me review some other highlights and reminders:

- **WEEKDAY MASS:** Please attend regularly and participate in the Mass of the Church.
- **MARDI GRAS/PALM BURNING:** On *Tuesday, February 24 at 7 p.m.* there will be a special liturgy to burn our old palms and make ashes for the celebration that begins Lent. Please bring a dessert to share after the liturgy. We will gather in the Committee Room and burn the ashes on Borromeo Plaza (the entrance on the north side of the church). Please come to the liturgy – but if unable – please bring your old palms to the church by Sunday, February 22.
- **FASTING:** We fast from food on Ash Wednesday and Good Friday as a way for us to spiritually prepare and recognize our need to not indulge. We have one main meal and two small meals, for those who are physically able. We abstain from eating meat on Ash Wednesday, the Fridays of Lent and Good Friday to remind ourselves of the sacrifices, the ways we are called to holiness in our lives.
- **HOLY WATER:** Years ago it was customary to "fast" from the holy water during Lent. Church rules have been clarified and holy water fonts/stoops are only emptied during the beginning two days of the Triduum. This sacramental is still used, since Lent is about renewing our baptismal covenant.
- **FOCUS ON THE CROSS:** On Ash Wednesday, we have the cross placed on our forehead, the very same spot where we were traced with the cross of Christ at our baptism. We focus on this cross during Lent, especially Good Friday during the Triduum. The cross we venerate on Good Friday is used for the entire Paschal Season (Lent, Triduum & Easter – 96 Days). We have 4 crosses at Saint Charles – the one used during this time was made by members of our Vietnamese Community with wood blessed by the true Cross.
- **COVERING THE STATUES:** We fast from devotions and work on our interior spirituality during the season of Lent. We remove the plants from the sanctuary and vestibules as a way to symbolize that we are removing the areas of sin and diversion in our lives. Because of this, the custom of veiling or covering statues came into practice. Our Liturgy Commission made a decision two years, based on the rubric of the church to veil statues, and to extend it for the entire season of Lent (rather than the last few weeks) and unveil during the singing of the "Gloria" during Holy Thursday, when Lent is over.
- **STATIONS OF THE CROSS:** Each Friday during Lent and on Good Friday, there will be the celebration of the Way of the Cross at **Noon**. If you would like to help carry the cross or a candle, please let me know. We will have a special Social Justice Stations of the Cross on **Friday, February 27th at 7 p.m.**
- **MORNING PRAYER or EVENING PRAYER:** The official prayer of the church each day is celebrated at 8 a.m. and 5 p.m. While only clerics and religious orders are bound to these prayers, the entire church is strongly encouraged to participate in the official prayer of the church. These liturgies prepare us and deepen our experience of Eucharist. Here at Saint Charles, we pray the Liturgy

of the Hours in the presence of the Blessed Sacrament in the chapel. Share with your boss the importance of this prayer in your life and take time once a week to join with us in this special time, before or after work, or both. It will become the best 20 minutes of your life!

- **OPERATION RICE BOWL:** Save those coins and other bills by your sacrifices. Skip a coffee and put it in your rice bowl. We will have a special priest, from Catholic Relief Services (Fr. David Garcia) who will talk about CRS and ORB.
- **NO FLOWERS DURING LENT:** One of the church rubrics, to maintain the spirit and season of Lent is to not have any flowers in church until the procession of the Gloria during the Easter Vigil. The other two exceptions are the Solemnities of Saint Joseph (March 19) and the Annunciation (March 25). This is always challenging for people, especially when there might be a funeral. We fast from the beauty of flowers, song (no "Alleluia") and other ways so that we deepen our affection for these items in the Easter Season. Thanks for not leaving flowers for the Sacred Heart, Saint Ann or Saint Jude – wait until Easter to share your flower intentions. In the meantime, have a Mass offered?
- **PREPARING FOR INITIATION:** We keep in our prayers those special people who are preparing for the sacraments of initiation (baptism, confirmation and eucharist). There is a special celebration on the First Sunday of Lent, March 8, here in our parish and then at the Cathedral-Basilica, where the archbishop chooses these members to have the sacraments celebrated in our parish at the Easter Vigil. Lent continues for the baptized as a time for us to renew our own baptismal covenant with the Lord that was made when we were baptized, as an infant, child or adult. **During the 3rd- 5th week of Lent, cycle A readings are used for the scrutinies. (We thank the lectors in advance!)**
- **ASH WEDNESDAY SCHEDULE:**
 - **7 a.m. Morning Prayer with Distribution of Ashes** (25 minutes service) **(Remind Outline next week.)**
 - **9 a.m. Eucharist** (with Distribution of Ashes after the homily, with the School Students, 1 hour 10 minute service)
 - **12:10 p.m. Eucharist** (with Distribution of Ashes after the homily, 50 minute service)
 - **5:30 p.m. Evening Prayer with Distribution of Ashes** (25 minute service)
 - **7 p.m. Eucharist** (like the 9 and 12:10, with our Religious Formation students, trilingual celebration, 1 hour 10 minute service)
- **EUCCHARISTIC ASSOCIATES:** All are welcome – come for one, or for all of these special times/or events, ***First Thursday (the day of the Eucharist), March 5:***
 - 4:15 p.m. Rosary (shrine chapel)
 - 5:00 p.m. Evening Prayer (shrine chapel)
 - 5:30 p.m. Novena with Saint Peter Julian Eymard (shrine chapel)
 - 6:00 p.m. Potluck dinner (Mahady Meeting Room, bring a dish to share for 10)
 - 6:30 p.m. Eucharist Talk (after or during supper in the MMR depending on the topic)

MARCH TOPIC: Aggregation of the Blessed Sacrament:

Come and learn if you wish to be an associate member of the Blessed Sacrament (yes, as a lay person!), following in the footsteps of Saint Peter Julian Eymard. Father Eymard founded the order for priests, brothers, deacons, sisters and laity. Now, the Congregation of the Blessed Sacrament is renewing it's lay associates and formalizing this relationship, especially as the brothers and priests leave. With laity continuing the mission, our special lay associates will continuing the mission of the Congregation of the Blessed Sacrament. Learn about this special church law, canonical status of aggregation – lay people living the mission of the Blessed Sacrament.

- **SOLEMNITY OF SAINT JOSEPH:** Thursday, March 19: Office holiday – closed for this special holy day.

- **PARISH MISSION:** Saturday, March 21 (starting at the 5 p.m. Mass) until Wednesday, March 25. Here are some highlights:
 - **Monday night Penance Service: 7 p.m. in church**
 - **Tuesday night Taize Service: 7 p.m. in church**
 - **Wednesday night Potluck: 6 p.m. in gymnasium (note the change of venue)**
 - **Wednesday closing Mass: 7 p.m. in church**
- **SOLEMNITY OF THE ANNUNCIATION:** Wednesday, March 25: Office holiday – closed for this special holy day.
- **ANOINTING OF THE SICK:** During the 11 a.m. Mass, Sunday, March 29, or anytime by request after the Mass. (If you are going into the hospital for surgery, nursing home or other care facility, celebrate this sacrament with one of the priests.)
- **REMEMBER THE ACA:** You heard about the needs in the archdiocese for 2009. Help our parish truly be a stewardship parish with every parishioner pledging something for the archdiocese. We must have each parish family pledge – to support our church, the church of New Mexico. **(A MINIMUM of \$10 is requested, or one meal for the work of the archdiocese. George in his talk said, one meal a month, or \$10 a month to the Catholic Church in NM.)** We all enjoy the services from the archdiocese; thanks for helping this vital work continue.
